St. Vincent Experiences Growth Spurt

Since 1990 St. Vincent de Paul has been providing housing to those in need in Kootenai County. We started off with emergency shelter and in just a few short years made a natural progression to both transitional housing and affordable permanent housing, offering a full Continuum of Care to people experiencing economic and housing deficiencies.

Even as the Coeur d'Alene area started to grow in population and development, we continued to see more people going through a housing crisis. The



only way we could continue our mission of helping those in need was for our organization to grow as well.

Fall 2007

As a matter of fact, 2007 has been a key year in that growth!

We began the year with the purchase of a 24-unit apartment complex in Post Falls, Ross Point I. This was accomplished through Rural Development and Idaho

Housing and Finance Association. In September we finalized the purchase of the adjacent 24-unit apartment complex, Ross Point II, also with funds through these two agencies. This increased our affordable housing units by almost 70% and preserved these units that were at risk of going market rate for low-income residents.

As many community members may already know from the local media, St.

Vincent applied for the acquisition of the Coeur d'Alene Federal Building downtown on 4th and Lakeside through a grant process. With homeless providers getting top priority in this process, our organization received the award! Although it will be two years before we will get to use the building (while the new federal building is being built), we view this as an amazing opportu-



nity! As our programs have grown over the years, our offices have not, making them too small for our needs and scattered across various locations. The

WHAT IS HOMELESSNESS?

Can you see it here in Kootenai County? When you hear the word "homeless," what images come to your mind?

Most people think of individuals who live outside,



those who are in the evident and extreme side of homelessness. We often think of those living in cars, on the sidewalks, or in tents and cardboard boxes. This is only one segment.



St. Vincent de Paul also believes that any person who lives from friend to friend or relative to relative, is being evicted, or is living in an

emergency accommodation or inadequate housing is experiencing homelessness. Being homeless is more about a lack of security, a lack of belonging, a lack of privacy, and a lack of safety than it is about being without a roof over your head.

As we gear up for the National Hunger and Homelessness Awareness Week, it comes to our attention that na-

tionally, there are thousands of individuals and families who are homeless and living in





emergency accommodation. For every family or individual that leaves St. Vincent de Paul's Transitional Housing programs, several more are waiting to enter. You can't always see them because they're not always living on the streets necessarily; but they are without a home to call their own. They are homeless and here in Kootenai County.

federal building will give us the ability to expand vet still be in one centralized location. In addition, it will provide us the ability to offer a day center for our homeless clients to come in off the streets and get referrals, job counseling, and other needed services. We have invited other local non-profit agencies to join us at this new location making service delivery more convenient and localized. With the inclusion of new retail shops (an art gallery, antique shop, and

coffee bar) that will provide job training to our homeless clients, we feel this will be a nice addition to the downtown district.

Our final project, the purchase of the 11-unit Sandman Motel on Sherman Avenue, became a reality with a \$989,125 grant fromthe Idaho Department of



Health and Welfare. With only \$2 million available, St. Vincent was awarded the highest amount in the state, allowing us to purchase this property. With some minor renovation, we will be able to turn it into more transitional housing. These 11 units will be used for homeless clients who struggle with mental health issues and will also be used in conjunction with an increased grant per diem award through the U.S. Department of Veteran's Affairs.

Helping Others: Recognizing the Volunteers

The dictionary defines a volunteer as "a person who performs a service willingly and without pay." That's a good definition but it doesn't quite tell the whole story. Coeur d'Alene's St. Vincent de Paul is an organization that functions because of its dedicated and skilled volunteers.

During a meeting of the Vincentians at the St. Thomas Center, Dick Mott heard there was a need for volunteers at St. Vincent de Paul and he jumped on it in September 2006. He has a genuine heart for the homeless and gives his time at the Social Services Office assisting with client data entry, handling phones, making referrals, and directing clients to the right staff for assistance.

Not a newcomer to volunteering, Dick got his start at the Uptown Faith Community Center in San Diego, California. UFCC is a day center where he helped the homeless with
