Having begun in 1988 in a little corner of the Coeur d'Alene thrift store, St. Vincent de Paul's Social Service Office has grown to be the heart of our agency and the entry point for most of our self-sufficiency programs. Located now in the front of our Men's Emergency Shelter, this office sees into the neediest corners of Kootenai county, offering

In 2006 alone, almost 6,500 people received help through this office with various types of social service assistance, plus close to 25,000 meals were served to people in need. On an average day, our social service staff see 18 people, aiding them with services such as:

- Emergency items of food, shelter, personal hygiene items.
- Emergency vouchers for clothing, gas, and needed household items.
- Community networking and referrals to other needed assistance.

2007 will be another busy vear here at St. Vincent de Paul. As Kootenai County continues to grow, we continue to see a great need in our community. Concerns of affordable "work-force" housing is a hot topic among our local policy makers, as it should be. Since our organization is one of the leaders in our area for lower-income housing issues, we are pleased that these concerns are finally being talked about and dealt with beyond non-profit agencies!

St. Vincent de Paul is dedicated to serving the lowerincome workers who can't afford housing yet who are so vital to our community's growth, success, and sustainability. To further this commitment, we will be closing soon on a 24-unit apartment complex in Post Falls which was at-risk of going market rate. We also hope to close later this year on another 24unit complex in the same location. With these purchases, 48 low-income individuals and/or families will continue to have a place to call home!

Each year Art on the Edge holds an annual fundraising dinner during the traditional New Orleans Mardi Gras festival. This was the second year for the kids' festival. These events are not only a great way for kids to learn about art and the creative process, but for the community to learn about and support this very worthwhile after school program, which is free to all the children who participate. And, thanks to the support during this year's dinner and kids' festival, Art on the Edge raised close to \$22,000.
